## WHAT A WAY TO TRAVEL - THOSE WERE THE DAYS!

I came across a couple of interesting pictures from a Facebook group the other day and thought I would research the pictures I found. Thanks to Google and Wikipedia, here are some interesting facts about the photos - probably the most stylish way to cross the channel . . . .

Silver City Airways was an airline based in the United Kingdom that operated mainly in Europe between 1946 and 1962. Unlike many airlines at the time, it was independent of government-owned corporations; its parent company was Zinc Corporation, an Australian company involved mainly in mining and mineral processing. The name "Silver City" originated as a nickname of Broken Hill, Australia - an area famed for silver mines, including some owned by the airline's parent company.

On 7 July 1948, a Silver City Bristol Freighter operated the first cross-Channel air ferry service, between Lympne near Folkestone in Kent and Le Touquet on France's northern Côte d'Opale coast, with good road connections from and to London and Paris respectively. The new service, which initially operated on a seasonal charter basis, became a year-round scheduled operation in 1949. In the beginning, there was a flat $£ 32$ one-way fare to take a group of four passengers along with their car across the Channel. Once opposition from British European Airways (BEA) to the carriage of passengers travelling without vehicles was overcome, a new fare structure was introduced. For example, a group of four travelling with a small car was charged only $£ 27$, while the comparable fare for four people travelling with a large car remained at $£ 32$.

By 1950, the number of cars and passengers carried on Silver City's cross-Channel services roughly doubled to 5,000 and 24,000 respectively.

To encourage further traffic growth on its Lympne-Le Touquet cross-Channel car ferry service, Silver City reduced fares with effect from 19 September 1950: the

 rate for cars up to 14 feet in length was cut from $£ 27$ to $£ 19$ while the rate for larger vehicles dropped from $£ 32$ to $£ 25$. This reduction left Silver City's fares only slightly higher than the Dover-Calais ferry fares of British Railways' Southern Region and, together with the service's earlier extension permitting the carriage of cycles and motor cycles, helped establish the airline's ferry services as a serious competitor to the railways.

The success of Silver City's Lympne-Le Touquet air ferry service resulted in subsequent introduction of additional routes across the English Channel and to other parts of the United Kingdom.

Over the coming years, Silver City pursued a policy of continuous fare reductions to fill the additional capacity on its growing air ferry network. This included new car ferry services between Southampton (Eastleigh) and Cherbourg as well as between Southend (Rochford) and Ostend and a DC-3 passenger service linking Gatwick and Le Touquet. Both of the former commenced in spring 1952, while the latter was inaugurated the following year. As a result, the number of vehicles carried doubled from 5,000 to 10,000 between 1950 and 1952 and quadrupled to 40,000 by the end of the following year.

As indicated at the 2023 National event in Goondiwindi, the SA Singer Club has, after much deliberation, made the decision to move our event away from the 'traditional' Easter weekend to a time when accommodation is more easily found and at a better price. Also the event locations will be less crowded.

We completely understand this may be disappointing to some but we felt that with the issues in finding a 'Nationals Headquarters' that can accommodate all attendees, to a standard befitting our event and at a price that was reasonable in these times of ever increasing costs, this was our only option. Many of our sister SA clubs have, over the years successfully moved their national events away from Easter for this very reason.

We chose mid-week dates, again for the same reasons of cost and fewer crowds at venues and on the roads. It allows interstate participants to travel there and back on the weekends either side, or extend their stay in SA if you so desire. The dates chosen are school holidays in some states (but not in SA), so this may assist those with younger families in attending, despite it not being Easter.

In addition, we decided to make the event 3 full days, plus arrival and departure days so that we can have a more relaxed event while still undertaking the activities we have planned. We also felt that this allows people to head for home in a more relaxed (and safer) way on the last morning rather than trying to decide what they can attend before heading off, as has been the case.

Victor Harbor and SA's South Coast (Fleurieu Peninsula) are famous for many things, including:

- It was the site of the 1936 South Australian Grand Prix (no Singers in this event sadly)
- Australia's FIRST Railway was run between Goolwa and Port Elliot (later extended to Victor)
- Nearly all produce from inland Qld, NSW and Victoria was shipped by river to Goolwa then sent to its next destination through Pt Elliot and later Port Victor
- It was a possible site for Adelaide, luckily for Victor, William Light decided the plains to the north were better suited
- American whalers and sealers operated here even before the colony was settled
- Humpbacks and southern right whales visit every winter, now the whalers have gone.
- It's great surf
- The southern vineyards are only a short travel away.

Planning is in its early stages, but we already have more great options that can be fitted into 3 days. Travel distances each day shouldn't be too long, maybe 40 km maximum on the longest days, so it will suit even the oldest Singers, and there aren't too many hills. We are looking to have a range of activities to suit all ages and interests (not just cars I promise).

We will have a get-together on the first evening (Monday 7th), hopefully the usual "trading Tables" and possibly the start of the Rocker Cover Races and then we'll begin in earnest on the Tuesday. Our Theme night is likely the Tuesday with our Formal Presentation on Wednesday night and a more informal dinner Thursday to allow for an early night and "quick getaway" the next day. With people potentially wanting to leave sometime on Thursday we will likely make that evening a "pay your own way" event and not be covered by the event fees. But this is all to be decided. I am more than happy for feedback/suggestions. If there are no objections we could move the presentation night to the Thursday instead.

We are aiming to keep entry fees as low as we can, hopefully $\$ 300$ an adult, but we need a better idea of numbers and costs before we can finalise this.

Our venue - The McCracken Country Club has a range of accommodation options. See the attached "Registration of Interest" form for pricing. We have negotiated a "Fixed Price" for 2025 no matter what happens with inflation. The Resort facilities are of a very high standard and we have use of them all (there is a charge for golf. There is plenty of parking including for trailers in the resort grounds. The room price noted includes a "Buffet Breakfast" for 2 in the Resort's Bistro, when we will also have our morning briefings. If there are additional people in your room this will need to be added in, plus the additional person fee.

To allow you to start planning, the Event Theme will be 'Having a Whale of a Time' and our traditional 'Dress Up' night will be: come in a 'Nautical Theme.

We really hope you can join us in Victor Harbor in 2025. Please do not hesitate to contact me if you have any questions/feedback/suggestions whatsoever. We want to make this an enjoyable event for all.
