



Nathan Tasca - "Have you seen this?" There was a screenshot from a Facebook Marketplace group Veteran Cars and Parts for sale, where someone in Adelaide was selling 1916 Singer 10 engine pieces for \$250. Nathan and I both thought this was a very desirable piece of Singer equipment and while neither of us had a use for them, we both felt if one of us didn't want them the other did. Being a closed Facebook Group, you needed to be a member (Nathan was, but I wasn't), so I sent off a request to join (even today this hasn't been processed).

The seller, Ross, had told Nathan someone in Queensland wanted the engine, but it was too difficult / costly for him to ship there. The next morning while walking my dog on the beach I received a call from Graham Smith, "Have you seen the pictures I sent you?" "No," I replied "but I bet it's about a Singer 10 engine". Indeed it was. Graham who has been collecting parts to build up a "teens" Singer 10 was very keen to get the engine. "Leave it with Nathan and me" I said. Having had no luck in joining the Facebook group, I contacted Nathan and he let Ross know the engine was 'Sold' and got his contact number for me to arrange pick up and payment. As an aside, Graham wasn't the Queensland person who had contacted Ross.

I called Ross, who turned out to be located just up the road at Strathalbyn. There was an amazing number of Singer links in this story, Ross has been running a business called Autocar Creations,

which he is winding down so is clearing out his workshop and has decided to sell the old Singer engine. Many years back, Ross was commissioned to restore the Singer 10 owned by the Robertson family of Chowilla, who needed some engine parts. So contacted someone else he knew who had a "teens" Singer 10 - Rex Howard. Rex kindly sold him a semi-complete engine. Ross used the two engines to build up as one and the bits now for sale are the leftovers. We were lucky enough to have the restored Chowilla Singer join us at the 2019 All British Day at Echunga, and what a car it is!



Ross gave me a tour of his workshop to see his remaining work projects; his focus is almost entirely on veteran cars but sadly I didn't get any photos. He did send me a photo later of another Singer Special he built for someone in SA that raced at Pt Wakefield and Mallala.

So, I paid Ross the very fair sum of \$250, loaded up the engine bits and headed home. They now reside safely in my shed awaiting Graham to collect at the 2025 Singer Nationals. "Smithy" I expect your engine to look as fine as the Chowilla Singer!

This just shows what can be achieved by a group of Singer enthusiasts across state borders! (Singers sans frontiers)

SINGER SPEEDS



A report from the Penrith speed trials in 1928 involving a Singer Junior —

The driver, a Mr Beasley, reported his fastest lap was at 64 mph (103kph), with an average speed just over 56 mph (90 kph). The Junior was only 3 weeks out of his shipping case, and Mr Beasley said he was surprised at the car's cornering and road holding abilities. Outside the trials, the driver said he had travelled 150 miles (241 km), finding the car remarkably comfortable and that corners on Blue Mountains roads could be taken at 25 mph (40 kph) quite simply.

Ultra High-Powered Vehicles – New U Class Licence (SA)

Do you drive an ultra high-powered vehicle? You'll soon need a new class of licence to drive it.

From 1 December 2024, drivers of an ultra high-powered vehicle must hold a U class licence.

An ultra high powered vehicle is defined as any vehicle, other than a bus, motor bike or motor trike that has:

- a gross vehicle mass of up to 4.5 tonnes; and
- a power to weight ratio of 276 kilowatts per tonne or more.

If you fear damaging your car when hitting a pothole, read on. Until 1961, there was a Common Law Rule of non-feasance in Britain dating from 1788 (and hence applied in Australia), that road owners/authorities had legal immunity for damage when they had failed to carry out repair work on a road, bridge or footpath. It goes without saying, this was an incentive to the authorities not to bother repairing roads! Britain abolished this rule in 1961, but Australia took until 2001 to do so, but only after appeal cases involving a bridge collapsing on a car and a pedestrian tripping on a footpath. Even then, the High Court's repeal of the law was a 4-3 decision. By the way, the Romans occupied Britain 2000 years ago, not 4000, though it's remarkable that intact Roman road segments are still being uncovered from time to time.
