

Stephen Bitmead's Bird to Baywood account

UNDAY Oct 20th provided absolutely perfect weather for this year's Bay to Birdwood. Because we've been moving house and my shed is yet to be built at our new house, our Singer Ten is still garaged at Goolwa, so we took our SAAB Sonett on this year's run. Since I first "bent it" in a previous B2B run, I just did some cursory checks on the SAAB to ensure everything was "shipshape", as she'd been running so well, including the drive up from Goolwa to Adelaide some two weeks earlier. This year, we arranged to travel up "in convoy" with friends in their Alfasud (and a beautiful example it is) and organised for a "meet up" on Burbridge Road at 7:30am.

Wendy and I set off from Vale Park just before 7am and all was going great (well except for not cleaning the windscreen and the sun glare was causing havoc), until suddenly on Fitzroy Terrace the Sonett started to backfire. I looked down and the oil light was glowing brightly – I checked the oil gauge and it was showing 60psi! Hmmm! I pulled over, checked the dipstick, and yes ,"No OIL!" So much for "Cursory Checks"! I set off on a fast jog to the OTR on Main North Road 700 metres away (according to Google) and luckily found amongst all the food and grocery items, an overpriced 5 litre container of oil. The car supplies section is the smallest section in a "Service Station" — who'd have thought it! More varieties of doughnuts there than all the car parts combined! So much so, they even did not sell funnels! I jogged back to the car and saw that, without a funnel, I'd lose most of the oil on the ground trying to pour it into the engine. Luckily the B2B Instruction Sheet, printed on a nice glossy paper, was able to be rolled into a "1½ size funnel", which Wendy held while I poured the oil in.

With the engine topped up and running smoothly, we headed off to the rendezvous point, arriving some 25 minutes late. We were amongst the last cars to arrive but got tacked on the back of a row, with our friends in the next row. We caught up with Jeff and Rob, looking spiffing, while we were still flustered but relieved we'd made it and the Sonett was OK. Due to our late arrival we didn't get the signal to leave until after 10:30. So, we had to listen to the starter's commentary just far too long (on Trevors Singer - "you'd buy a Singer if you were 'moving up' from a Morris, but not going for a MG" - Baa humbug!) But the run went

fantastically well; the street crowds seemed smaller than before and the chance to interact from the Sonett just isn't the same as a Vintage Singer, although the kids love me "popping" the headlights. Overall, the traffic went smoothly; but for some obscure reason it was dead slow through Gumeracha. We arrived in time for a late lunch, a relax, chats to some others, had a check-out of some of the 1500 cars parked there, then headed home, weary but relieved. A very big lesson learnt from this days outing. The dipstick level barely changed through the whole trip, but there is a bit of a minor leak.

Ultra High-Powered Vehicles – New U Class Licence (SA)

Do you drive an ultra high-powered vehicle? You'll soon need a new class of licence to drive it.

From 1 December 2024, drivers of an ultra high-powered vehicle must hold a U class licence.

An ultra high powered vehicle is defined as any vehicle, other than a bus, motor bike or motor trike that has:

- a gross vehicle mass of up to 4.5 tonnes; and
- a power to weight ratio of 276 kilowatts per tonne or more.

VISIT TO OLD GOVERNMENT HOUSE, BELAIR

N 1974, the Sunbeam Car Owners' Club (SA) was formed and that club's first run was to Belair National Park and other car club members at that time were invited to come along. This September, the club celebrated its 50 year old formation by a revisit to the park and Old Government House in particular. Several Sunbeam Club members, along with those from the Singer, Armstrong-Siddeley, Hillman, Humber and Riley Car Clubs came along, 22 in all.





Many attending took the opportunity to first of all stroll around the bushland paths and the Playford Lake, also purchasing from the excellent State Flora shop, which specialises in native plants. Just before 11am, everyone assembled in 3 groups for the tour of Old Government House, built in 1860 as a summer residence for the State Governor. The house fell into disuse in 1871 when a grander summer residence was built at Marble Hill which, in turn, got burnt down in the Black Sunday fire of 1955. For 6 years during the 1880s, the 2-bedroom servants' quarters for Government House were used to manufacture rabbit poison. The whole property was then practically unused until 1960 when it was restored and opened to the public in 1961. The gardens, in traditional English style, are maintained by an enthusiastic band of volunteers, with the whole venue available for weddings.









All 3 tour groups were regaled for over an hour with stories of the house's rooms, occupants, clothes and artefacts donated. For example, I was fascinated by a metal contraption with a handle; it turned out this was an ice scraper. Even in the second half of the 19th century, summer drinks could be served with ice, thanks to blocks of ice delivered to the Port Adelaide docks by ships sailing from *Canadian* ports. The ships had been loaded with massive ice

blocks cut from the frozen Great Lakes at the start of the Canadian winter!



The Old Government House cellar (in which the ice blocks were stored) was adjacent to a plunge pool containing, not unsurprisingly, exceedingly chilly water. Public bathing was frowned upon in polite Victorian society, and the plunge pool was the first indoor pool in South Australia.

After a convivial BYO lunch, participants were asked to vote for the best classic car parked nearby. The most popular car was a Riley Elf. A 50th birthday celebration concluded the day.

Many thanks to Paul Heuer and his enthusiastic committee members from the

Sunbeam Club for a fantastic day out.

CLIPPER SHIP VISIT

Built in 1864, the Clipper carried immigrants from United Kingdom for 23 years. Conversions then became part of its history as a Collier ship, Hospital isolation ship, Royal Navy ship and WWII accommodation ship. The ship was re-named to SV "Carrick" in 1948 and later on the River Clyde flooding occurred on two occasions, ownership moved to the Clyde Ship Trust; but the ship sinks in Princes docks in 1991, later raised with another change in ownership to the Scottish Maritime Museum.

It was renamed officially back to City of Adelaide by HRH Prince Philip in 2001 before being "rescued" under the Clipper Ship *City of Adelaide* Ltd Group under its new and current ownership resulting in its transportation from UK to Adelaide.



The last Rootes Clubs outing for 2024 was a visit on 10 November to Adelaide's historic clipper ship restoration project, organised by the Humber Car Club. Participants travelled to the Port Adelaide site for morning tea, then a video and talk by Peter Christopher, Director, Clipper Ship — City of Adelaide, before group guided ship tours conducted by volunteers. Lunch followed at the Lighthouse Wharf Hotel.
